## Keeping Warm In Winter

#### **Keep moving**

Staying active is not only essential for your general wellbeing and fitness, it also generates heat and helps to keep you warm. When you're indoors, and where you are able try not to sit still for more than an hour. If walking is difficult you can do chair-based exercises while sitting. Even moving your arms and legs and wiggling your toes can help you keep warm.

#### Eat well

Hot meals and drinks help to keep you warm, so eat at least one hot meal each day and have hot drinks during the day. Include a good range of foods in your diet and it's also important to eat enough, especially in winter. Not eating enough and becoming underweight is bad for your health as it makes it more difficult to keep warm and fight infections.

#### Consider taking a vitamin D supplement

Our bodies create vitamin D from sunlight when we're outdoors. We need it for healthy bones, teeth and muscles. During the winter months in the UK the sun isn't strong enough for our bodies to make vitamin D, and it's difficult to get the amount we need from food alone. You might want to speak to your GP to discuss taking a supplement to boost your levels in winter.

#### Keep your spirits up

It's not unusual to feel down in winter – particularly when the days are short and it can get dark by 3.30pm. Try to keep to your usual routine and if you can't visit friends or family, make sure you phone them regularly for a chat. If you can and it's not too cold, go for a short walk in the middle of the day, or at least go outside while there is daylight. There may be local classes or social groups you can attend.

There are plenty of activities and events organised by our own Activities Co-ordinators that are open to all residents, why not come and join in the fun, it could help beat your winter blues. Please speak to your Activities Co-ordinators or House Managers if there is a group you may be interested in or if there is something new you would like to do.

The carers are the ones in blue, the cleaners all in pink. Then there is the Manager, and some mystery men in suits.


We have many kindly volunteers, and a cheerful kitchen staff. Maintenance work hard for us, to make the house our home.

The colour and scent of summer flowers, and the earthy fragrance after it showers.


A thunderstorm with its sound and light show, Or ducklings following their mother in a row.

This was an eagerly anticipated performance after their brilliant show in 2018. The team of 5 Morris Dancers and a Musician performed traditional 'North



to a Miss Saunders & a Mr Hanlan taking the role of an unusual housekeeper. Along with the help of an army of volunteers this act grew into Abbeyfield Society, a national and international movement. In 2008 when Richard died there were 850 Abbeyfield houses in Britain accommodating residents. Richard around 5000 was awarded an OBE in 1985 & a Lifetime Achievement Award in the 2005 Pride of Britain Awards. A blue plaque recognises the

The Abbeyfield Society was founded 63 years ago by Richard Carr-Gomm, Richard was an ex-captain in the Coldstream Guards from which he was awarded the Croix de Guerre. After he left the army he became very aware of how many elderly people lived lonely & isolated lives. In 1953 he took gratuity and volunteered as a home help. He then went on to purchase a terraced house and offered accommodation

In 1968 Jack Hardy, Barbara Rundle, Nora Whittaker, Margaret Briggs & Tom Last bought Holme Lea with a mortgage of £7,500.00 from the Yorkshire Building Society. Committee with Mrs Margaret Briggs as the first Chairman. Holme Lea opened on 1st. 1970. January Charges were 12 guineas for a large room, 11 guineas for medium sized room & 10 guineas for a smaller room.

In 1980 After more fundraising by volunteers, money from the lottery, The Housing Association & also government donations Ivy Lea on Riddings Road was opened. In 2000 Brian Whittaker and Shannon Houliston saw the potential in the vacant Grove Nursing Home. They decided to try to raise the funds to develop the site for Abbeyfield. A large team of fund raisers including Brian Dale, Ian Hepworth, Ann Crowther, David Halliwell and and volunteers managed to raise the money & negotiations with Abbeyfield Society proved successful. The first phase was to build the Flats known as The Court. These flats were sold and the resulting funds, around £3,000,000.00, were used to help with development of Grove House. The first residents moved into The Court in July 2002 and Grove House opened in 2003 under the Chairmanship of Brian Whittaker and Management of Sally Marney. In 2016 under the management of Jackie Bradfield, Abbeyfield the Dales was formed. It is now a huge organisation covering a large area of Yorkshire.

Many Thanks to Mary Heathcote for gathering and compiling all information. Mary can be seen below in the middle on the steps of Holme Lea in 1949 when it was Moorfield School.



## The Craft Hut



The Craft Hut opened its doors the first week of September this year which is looked after and managed by Volunteer Barbara Jordan. Barbara has always had an interest in the Summer House at Grove House since she was asked to do Santa's Grotto. After taking a break from volunteering she was asked back to do a Knit and Knatter group

with our residents at which point she had a look inside the Summer House and found it wasn't being used. After speaking to John Durkin the Volunteer Manager, Barbara came up with the idea for the Craft Hut. After a weekend preparing a proposal and receiving positive feedback from Ilkley on Facebook Barbara got the go ahead and the clearing out of the Hut began, along with contacting everyone who was interested and advertising. The Craft Hut sells anything that is handmade, created or collected. There are 'Hutters' who machine embroider, knit and sew. Lewis Garth refurbishes antique furniture and upcycles wood into chopping boards. Tracie Barnes makes pop-up cards, plaques and small gifts and her friend Linda does the sewing; making cushions and make-up bags etc. Caroline Smith and Avice Turnbull create art and Avice's husband Jim makes silver jewellery. Elissa, of Music Tuesdays creates her hyperbolic crochet. These are just some of the creators, however The Hut is open to anyone who wants to display and sell their work and collections. Unfortunately there isn't a catalogue as many of the items are one offs. Barbara is hoping that in the future the Craft Hut will hold workshops and drop-in sessions where people can try their hand at anything crafty and have a chat at the same time.

As well as this she hopes to have some out door events on the patio next year. The Craft Hut donates 15% of its sales to the Abbeyfield Residents Fund and is open Monday to Wednesday 10am-4pm. So pop in and have a browse and get some of your Christmas shopping done.



## Spanish Evening

result was a great transformation and Bev the hairdresser had a grand opening afternoon with prosecco and chocolates for the residents as they arrived.






## Blackpool




