Meet the Trustees ...

Martin Carter



**I first heard the name Abbeyfield in 2009. My mother, feeling her age at 83, was looking for a new home in Bradford to be closer to me and my family. One day she saw a sign outside a large, attractive house on Leylands Lane, advertising a flat to let. It was an Abbeyfield House. My mother lived there very happily for several years until her eventual sad demise.**

How did this lead to me becoming a trustee? A friend from church, Nora Whitham, was Chair of Trustees for the Abbeyfield Bradford Society, which managed the Leylands Lane house. In 2015, when I was nearing retirement, Nora asked if I would consider becoming a trustee. Already knowing Abbeyfield's valuable work, I thought that perhaps some of my skills might make at least a modest contribution and so I applied. Accepted by Bradford, which later merged into ATD, I have now been an Abbeyfield trustee for 10 years. (Nora herself retired in 2024 after 21 years of exceptional service.)

Before retirement I enjoyed a varied career. After a degree in chemistry I moved into industrial management, first in the historic Lever Brothers soap factory at Port Sunlight where, for a while, I managed the department making Vim scouring powder. I soon began looking for something contributing even more directly to human health and joined a pharmaceutical company making sterile medical products, including intravenous fluid containers and blood collection systems.

After about 10 years in industry I became concerned about the declining state of UK manufacturing and decided to change direction. I took a degree in economics and became a university lecturer, conveying economic ideas to business students and researching business organisation. Sadly I never solved the problem of industrial decline.

In some ways my role as a trustee is far more practical than my career as an academic. We engage in great detail with ATD's senior leaders, looking at every aspect of how the organisation achieves its most admirable aims, ranging from current challenges to long term planning for sustainability and even greater improvement. Especially enjoyable is meeting residents and staff to see how well ATD helps them in achieving happiness and fulfilment. My mother, if she were still here, would be absolutely delighted.

I am very proud to be a member of the Abbeyfield Mental Health Team, and I feel genuinely privileged to be part of an organisation that places such importance on compassion, dignity, and community.

Outside of work, I enjoy spending quality time with my family and taking my dog Oscar for long walks. I like to keep active and regularly take part in sponsored charity walks and runs. I've completed the London Marathon three times and have raised money for a range of charities along the way. I have a feeling there's still one more marathon in me... so watch this space!

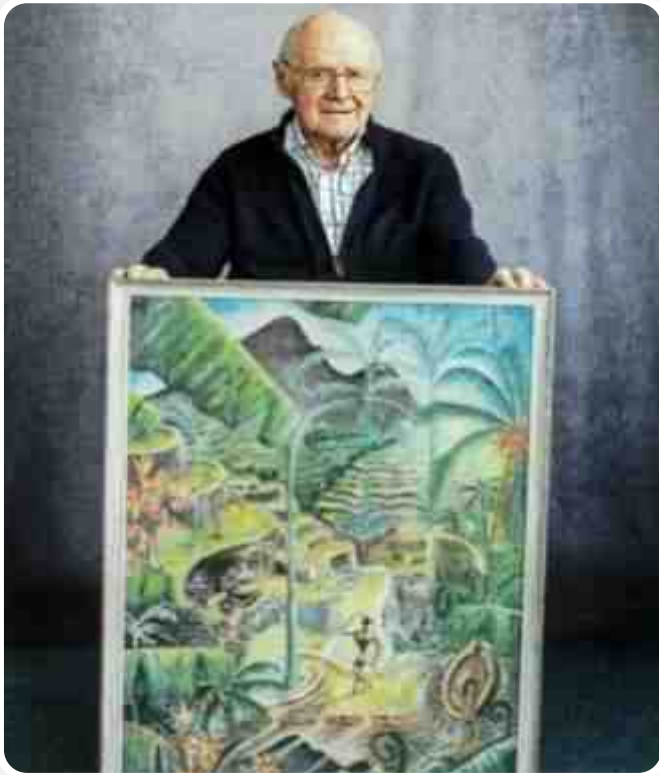

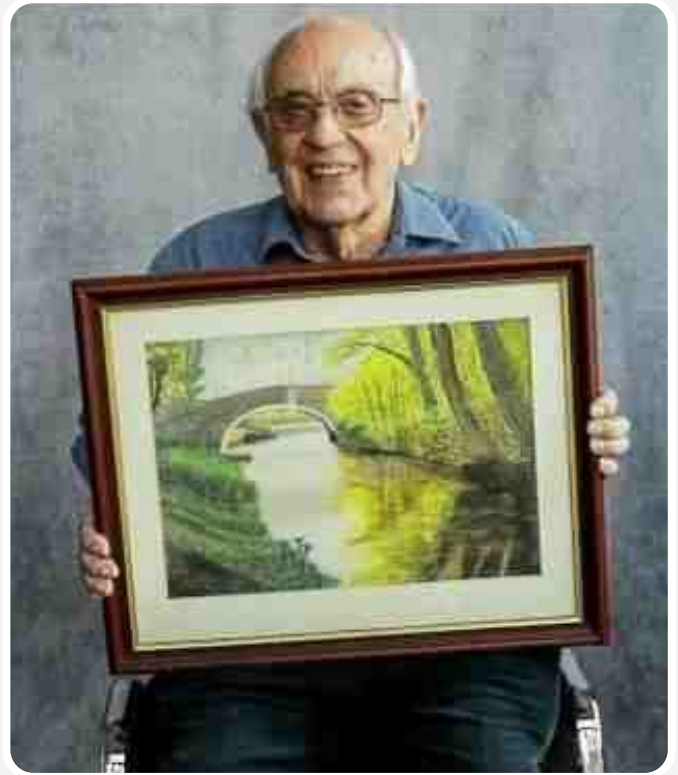

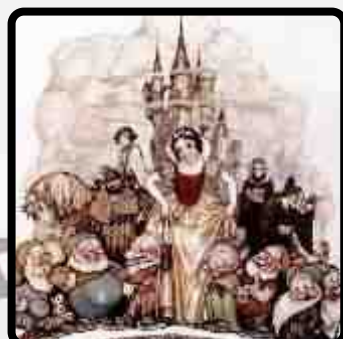
